Neighborhood Crime Breakdown, December 2020

Reporting Period: 01 November 2020 through 30 November 2020

Part 1 offense reports

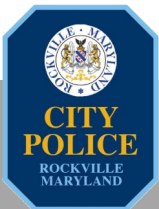
In November 2020, local police recorded 11 Part 1 offense reports within the boundaries of the Twinbrook Community Association (TCA), including:

- One (1) report of an aggravated assault, occurring on the 200 block of Meadow Hall Drive during the afternoon of November 30 between a male victim and an unknown assailant who accused the victim of stealing his or her phone.
- One (1) report a residential robbery, occurring on the 2200 block of Stanley Avenue during the evening of November 15, perpetrated a group of 3 men reportedly known to the victim's son. This case was forwarded to MCPD's Major Crimes Division.
- One (1) report of a residential burglary. Officers believed the victim in this case was under the influence of narcotics while making a report and also noted his history of drug abuse, inconsistent story, and strange and erratic behavior and statements.
- Six (6) reports of a theft-from-auto, 2 of which appear to be part of a series of 4 associated cases (involving 7 targeted vehicles) on Rockcrest Circle, Grandin Avenue, Debeck Drive, and Lewis Avenue between October 28 and November 02. The perpetrators in this series appear to be two individuals targeting unlocked vehicles in the early morning. The remaining 4 reports of theft-from-auto (including one theft of a license plate) appear to be isolated incidents.
- Two (2) reports of package thefts. In these cases, the victim addresses about 0.40 miles away and the thefts occurred about 2 weeks apart.

Part 2 offense reports

Local police also recorded six (6) reports of Part 2 offenses, to include 1 alcohol violation (public drunkenness), 3 simple assaults (two of which were domestic), and 2 cases of vandalism (one to a vehicle, and one to a residential window). The non-domestic simple assault involved a contractor and a victim at his home, and ended in the arrest of the contractor on an outstanding warrant.

With one possible exception—the residential vandalism may possibly be related to the thefts and destruction of political campaign signs related to the 2020 election—these incidents do not appear to related to one another, nor as part of a broader pattern.

Calls for Service Trends

Dispatchers recorded 72 calls for service within the boundaries of TCA in November, a typical amount when compared to a historic average of 67 calls per month. This figure is in the top 65% of historic monthly call volume.

Calls within two categories were significantly higher than their monthly average: calls concerning larceny and calls concerning violent crime. These two call categories have historically averaged 6 and 2 calls per month, respectively. To elaborate, within TCA in November 2020:

- Calls about larceny included 9 calls about a theft from a vehicle, including 1 theft of a motor vehicle part
- Calls about violent offenses included 3 calls about simple assault, 1 call about aggravated assault, and 1 call about a residential robbery.

Readers should note that calls described here ultimately result in reports describing an incident in a location outside of the TCA boundaries, or outside this reporting period. Below one can find a table describing the disposition of calls by category:
